## **Ekiti to raise seedlings for farmers**

Ekiti State Government is to raise 660,000 cocoa, 20,000 oil palm and 10,000 cashew seedlings, for its farmers this planting season. The Permanent Secretary, in the Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development, Mr. Wale Bello, made this known to newsmen. Thursday in Ado-Ekiti. Bello said the government decided to embark on the provision of the seedlings in order to broaden the state's economic base and fast track its industrial development.

The permanent secretary said the seedlings would be distributed to farmers in all parts of the state. Bello added that the gesture had re-affirmed the state government's determination to boost tree crop production in the state. He advised farmers to take advantage of the kind gesture of the government, saying that they should maintain their old cocoa farms ahead of time. Bello urged them to start preparing land for the new planting season and for expansion, adding that government would soon assist them with agricultural inputs and other working tools.

## **How cocoa factory uses its bean to help others**

IT'S the sweet taste of success - from both a business perspective and a community aspect - for workers at a top confectioner's site on the Welsh border. The Cadbury Trebor Bassett cocoa bean processing factory at Chirk, Wrexham, is a key location in the group's UK portfolio of sites, supplying both finished products and ingredients for chocolate manufacture elsewhere in the country.

The factory, with 186 employees, has just a few per cent of CTB's total workforce. In the greater scheme of things, it's a smallish site, but that hasn't stopped it earning a giant reputation within the group for its community programme. Site community champion Jim Davies, who has overseen the recent development of that programme, says employee volunteering and community commitment are one of the pillars of the group's CSR agenda. "The community programme on the site has evolved over a number of years because the business has always supported people doing things to help the community," says Davies.

### **CPC ups dividend by 33 percent**

Cocoa Processing Company CPC is set to pay its second dividend this year since going public in 2003. The company paid its first dividend last year for 2005 and its Managing Director Richard Amarh-Tetteh told Joy News that this year's dividend for the 2006 financial year will be an increase of 33 percent.

Speaking ahead of the company's AGM next month, Mr Amarh-Tetteh explained that though the company's expansion project was not completed it would go ahead to pay dividend. Shareholders of the Cocoa Processing Company had been concerned about the dividend pay out of the company but the MD said all would be well soon.

Mr Amarh Tetteh said on completion of the expansion project in September, 2007, it will begin exporting in large quantities various products including confectionaries and butter to African countries and other identified markets beyond.

### **There's cash for cocoa - Minister**

Mr. Anthony Evans Amoah, Western Regional Minister, on Thursday denied allegations that there was not enough funds in the system to pay for cocoa purchases and bonus to cocoa farmers. The Regional Minister, who was speaking at a Peoples' Assembly at Enchi in the Aowin-Suaman District said the government had made funds available for payment of bonus and cocoa purchases. Mr. Amoah said, "anybody who says there is no money to pay the bonus and cocoa purchases is lying". He said, the payment of bonus had started, but the problem was that some cocoa farmers did not have passbooks to indicate the amount of cocoa purchased.

Mr. Amoah said there was no evidence to indicate that chemicals meant for the mass cocoa spraying exercise in the area had been diverted. He said the government was prepared to investigate cases of diversion of chemicals for the spraying exercise if people could substantiate their allegations. Mr. Amoah said the National Disaster Management Organisation (NADMO) had embarked on a nation-wide tree planting project. He said people who participated in the project would be given food rationing and token allowances.

Mr. Amoah urged the youth to take advantage of the project as well as the National Youth Employment Programme and other avenues to get organised to assist in national development. He spoke against illegal felling of trees in forest reserves and advised chiefs, Members of Parliament and District Assemblies to identify those involved to enable them arrange meetings to discuss payment of royalties and social obligations. Mr. Amoah announced that the 56 kilometre Enchi-Asankrangwa road had been awarded to a Chinese Company, Top Construction Limited, at a cost of about 1 point 2 million dollars.

Mr. Kingsley Ofori-Asante, the District Chief Executive, said development had come to the area and that would be sustained. He said the assembly with support from its development partners had undertaken numerous educational and social projects. These included construction of 58 hand-dug wells in 47 communities and 82 bore-holes in 65 communities. Many people who attended the assembly complained contractors working in the area were not performing.

## **Early January dry hits Ghana cocoa regions**

ACCRA (January 23, 2007): Early January was dry in the No 2 cocoa grower Ghana, with no rainfall in the main growing regions as the arid, dusty northerly harmattan seasonal wind gathered pace, the Ghana Meteorological Agency (GMA) said on Monday.

## **Ivory Coast cocoa arrivals down**

ABIDJAN (January 23, 2007): cocoa arrivals at ports in Ivory Coast reached around 804,000 tonnes from October 1 to January 21, a rough estimate by exporters showed on Monday, compared with 805,800 tonnes delivered in the same period a year ago.

## **Cocoa eases amid two-sided fund trade**

NEW YORK (January 24, 2007): US cocoa futures contracts settled modestly lower on Monday after a lackluster session, with prices clawing up from earlier losses amid two-sided fund and speculative trade, traders said.

## **Cocoa rises on supportive industry buying**

NEW YORK (January 25, 2007): US cocoa futures contracts settled firm on early arbitrage buying amid a strong sterling against the dollar, and steady industry buying on Tuesday, traders said.

## **New York cocoa falls**

NEW YORK (January 26, 2007): US cocoa futures contracts dipped on Wednesday, settling near the session's lows on light volume, and pressure by the weak sterling and speculative selling, traders said. "Bids and offers were really wide," one trader said.
